SESSION WITH DR. SHALINI THAKUR

On 6th February 2023, the students of Grade 8 had an informative and enlightening session with Dr. Shalini Thakur, Programme Director - Oral Onco Surgery and Rehabilitation in the Head and Neck Surgical Oncology Department, HCG Cancer Centre. Her interest lies in the interdisciplinary rehabilitation of head and neck patients and tobacco cessation.

According to Dr. Shalini, most tobacco companies target adolescents, who are most vulnerable in their teenage years. She described nicotine as a classified poison and informed us that is not only addictive but also results in mood disorders and permanent lowering of impulse control, attention span, and aptitude for learning.

The session was very interactive, with some interesting questions asked by the students. Dr. Shalini further explained that it was necessary to stay away from tobacco and nicotine, and guard our family, friends, and loved ones from the pitfalls of both. So, I can go to the park

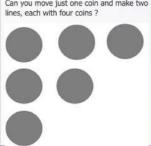

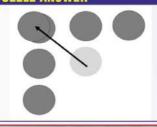
